Developing Church Planter Characteristics

After each video clip classify whether that characteristic is an ability of yours, a desire you have, or an opportunity you will need to pursue. Learning from Paul's Call to Ministry - Acts 9:1-19

What was Saul's call to ministry and how did he receive it?

In what ways did Ananias minister to Saul?

What else stands out to you in this story about how God calls people to leadership and ministry?

Paul's Initial Call - Acts 9:26-30 and 11:19-30

In what ways did Barnabas invest in and develop Saul?

What are some things that Saul might have learned from Barnabas when he served on the Antioch church leadership team with him?

What are key learnings for us to learn from the story of Barnabas and Saul about how leaders are called and developed?

An Encouraging Mentor - Acts 22:17-22

What was Paul doing when he "fell into a trance"?

Based on his own reasoning and passion, who was Paul wanting to minister to?

Who did Jesus tell him to minister to?

Why do you think Paul felt called to minister to the first group?

Why do you think Jesus redirected him to a different group?

What might we learn from this part of Paul's story about own our passions, reasoning, and God's call on our lives?

An Unexpected Command from Jesus - Acts 13:1-5

In verse 1, assuming that the leaders were listed in order of rank or importance with the most important being listed first (as was Luke's custom), who would the "senior pastor" of the church in Antioch have been? Who was the junior associate or possibly the youth pastor? Who was perhaps the pastoral intern (verse 5)?

Did Barnabas and Saul receive a call, or an affirmation of a call?

What else stands out to you about how Barnabas and Saul were sent out?

Why might Barnabas and Saul have chosen to take their mission trip specifically to the island of Cyprus and eastern Asia Minor–modern day Turkey (see Acts 4:36; 22:2-3)?

What are some lessons for us to learn from this passage and story?

A Pivotal Mission Juncture - Acts 13:6-12, 42, 46, 50; 15:36-41, Colossians 4:10, 2 Timothy 4:11

Barnabas' name consistently is mentioned before Saul's name in all passages before Acts 13:9. Then things abruptly shift and the story is about "Paul and his companions" and "Paul and Barnabas."

What do you think happened?

Considering that Barnabas was from Cyprus and Paul was from Tarsus in Cilicia, how might geography or "turf" have played a part?

How might Barnabas have felt when his leadership began to be eclipsed by Paul's?

How does Paul feel about John Mark in Acts 15:36-41? How does he feel about him years later when he is writing the second letter to Timothy (see 2 Timothy 4:11)?

What are the most important lessons for us about leadership development and calling from the story of Barnabas, Paul, and Mark?

Emerging from the Shadow of His Mentor

What stands out to you from the teaching and discussions on Paul's development as a leader?

Bobby Clinton's Stages of Leadership Development

Dream and Honor

Fears, Courage and Obedience

What is your greatest fear or insecurity? What is your next step in facing it? Who can help you overcome it?

Would you classify yourself as cautious, willing to take healthy risks (courageous), or a daredevil? What implication does that have for walking out your call in church planting?

How willing are you to obey God no matter what?
